Why learn about ethics?

Our whole school inquiry is centred around the three key concepts change, perspective and ethics. Providing our students with opportunities to grapple with ethical issues helps them to think beyond the surface and to consider the wider implications of their decisions. The report '2020 Global Human Capital Trends' produced by Deloitte, highlights ethical considerations as essential for leading the workplace of the future. It suggests we need to learn to ask not only "could we" but also "how should we"? This is particularly true where technology changes the way people work.

The report suggests that...

"Seventy-five percent of organizations say ethics related to the future of work are important or very important for their success over the next 12 to 18 months, but only 14 percent say they are very ready to address this trend."

So, by teaching our students to grapple with ethical issues we hope to provide them with the skills to think about the variety of perspectives and implications of decisions in a way that is caring and fair.

According to Bruce Weinstein, the five basic principles of ethics are:

- 1. Do no harm
- 2. Make things better
- 3. Respect others
- 4. Be fair
- 5. Be loving

These are very easy principles for us all to work with when making decisions that affect people and a great tool for our children to understand for their future.

Kerbside bin collection

The only plastics that can now be recycled are the following grades, the number in the chasing arrows triangle.

I = things such as pump, coca cola bottles

2 = milk bottles being an example

5 = ice cream containers

Look for the number please



- 3,4,6,7 plastics are no, all landfill
- Also no lids flat or screw, no glitter, no plastic wrap
- · No soft plastic i.e. you can scrunch it in your hand
- No hazardous waste (incl gloves and masks)



- Cardboard and paper must be clean
- Metal food cans and drink containers only, no lids
- · Glass bottle and jars, no window glass etc

All recycling must be clean If not clean, this will be dumped in landfill
